Course description:

This course introduces students to a wide-variety of poetry in English. Course texts are drawn from across historical periods and geographical locations, and will provide students with firm foundations in a range of poetic forms. The course will help develop close reading skills, and provide students with the critical and analytical tools required to interpret poetic texts at university-level. Students will also improve their library and research skills through this course, and will learn how to produce a strong, well-supported, and clearly-written academic essay. The course culminates with a registrar-scheduled exam.

Course learning outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate intermediate-level knowledge of a range of literary writings in poetry;
- 2. Understand and interpret poetic texts in relation to their historical and cultural contexts;
- 3. Pay close attention to the language of poetic texts;
- 4. Write a convincing academic paper using the conventions of English as an academic discipline;
- 5. Engage in meaningful conversations about poetry with peers;
- 6. Improve their library, research, and critical writing skills.

Texts and readings:

All course readings will be available digitally on D2L. *There is no requirement to purchase text books for this course.*

Learning technology requirements:

Students will need to have access to a laptop computer or smartphone in class time. There is a D2L site for this course which contains required readings and other relevant class resources and materials (see d2L.ucalgary.ca). Classes are held in-person and on-campus. Classes may occasionally be conducted via Zoom, depending on external factors such as weather and illness. Please ensure you have access to Zoom on your laptop or smartphone.

Assessments and Evaluation:

Library Skills Worksheet (5%): Students will complete a worksheet assignment following the library skills session. The worksheet will examine the student's skills in sourcing and citing peer-reviewed critical articles, book chapters, and e-books gained from the in-class discussion and accompanying video resources.

Practice Essay Plan (10%): In this 500-word assignment students will learn how to plan and develop an academic paper. They will begin by narrowing down a topic of interest to provide a clear, specific thesis statement that directly answers a set question. They will learn how to reference their citations in MLA 8, and show how they plan to integrate primary material into their argument. They will also develop the skills to structure their argument in a thoughtful and

critical way.

Research Paper (30%): A 1500-word research essay that develops skills from the practice essay plan. The students will engage with one of the course's poetic texts in its critical context. In addition, students are responsible for sourcing a peer-reviewed critical article that engages with the source material, and are expected to connect this article with their argument.

Midterm Examination (15%): Students will complete a 60-minute midterm examination consisting of a series of multiple-choice questions and short close-reading exercises.

Close Reading Exercises (10%): Participation in the course will be graded on the basis of four short close-reading exercises (2.5% each), to be administered randomly during class time throughout the term.

Registrar-Scheduled Exam (30%): Students will answer a selection of short questions and one longer passage analysis (choose one passage from a selection of three). The exam will be Open Book, and students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period. We are at the mercy of the registrar as to the time and date for the exam.

There are no extra-credit assignments available for this course. Students are required to submit their work through D2L in either .docx or .pdf formats. Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (e.g., an A- to B+) for each calendar day (not class meeting) that the assignment is overdue. No assignments will be accepted one week past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor. Students will receive 40% of their final grade by APRIL 12, 2023 and do not need to complete all assignments to receive a passing grade in this course.

Attendance and participation expectations:

Students are expected to attend class regularly and to be fully present and engaged in class activities and discussions. The participation grade for this course determined through four close-reading exercises scheduled at random throughout the term, as outlined in the assessment components section above. A rubric with detailed information about the assessment of participation is available on the course D2L site. If students miss a class session that is included as a component of participation, and wish to receive credit for that day's work, they must contact the instructor within 24 hours to discuss options to make up this component.

Conduct:
