ENGL 399: Introduction to Comics Fall 2021 Asynchronous Online

Course description:

An examination of the formal, historical, and social aspects of comics (comic strips, comic books, and graphic novels). Topics to be examined include the historical development of the comic form; formal analysis of the properties of comics; and the significance of comics in the contemporary media landscape.

This course will be fully asynchronous. This course will take place **online** via Desire2Learn (D2L). To best succeed in the course, students are encouraged to participate in the asynchronous learning tasks using the D2L learning environment.

Course learning outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a knowledge of the history of the comic book in the United States
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the formal properties of comics
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of the way meaning is communicated in comics
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of the major genres of comics in the United States

Learning technology requirements:

There is a D2L site for this course which contains required readings and other relevant class resources and materials (see d2L.ucalgary.ca).

In order to successfully engage in their learning experiences at the University of Calgary, students taking online, remote and blended courses are required to have reliable access to the following technology:

Assessments and Evaluation:

Discussion Contributions (throughout the term). While discussion forums have been created for each lecture and reading in this course and will be monitored throughout, fourteen of these forums (spaced over the term and beginning on September 23) have been flagged as **requiring** student participation. All students are expected a substantive contribution to the discussion on these days (NO MORE THAN 200 words of writing) that shows attention to earlier contributions and which extends and expands the discussion, or which begins a new discussion line entirely. Students will be graded on the quality of their contribution to the online discussions and their ten highest grades will be counted towards their final grade. Each of these ten contributions are worth five per cent of the grade in this course, for a total of fifty per cent total.

Short Assignments (October 5, October 12, October 21, November 2, November 30). At five times during the term you will be prompted to provide feedback to the class readings in non-traditional ways. These may include: Reducing a comic strip to base elements following the methods of Karasik and Newgarden; rewriting a page of a comic book as if it were a prose novel; sorting and assessing images from anonymously produced comics; using the process of detournement on a comics page; creating a short autobiographical comic. Each of these short assignments is worth five percent of the final grade in this course and you are required to complete any four of your choice. These assignments are worth 20% of the final grade in this course.

Annotation Project (December 9, 2021). Pick a page that you find interesting in a comic book and trace it. Do not attempt to recreate the original page, but attempt to distill its main features in a simplified drawing. If text appears on the page you should trace the captions or balloons, but do not fill in the text. When this is complete, annotate the page that you have created in the empty spaces (balloons, captions, gutters) in order to highlight the important features. You might consider: colour, shading, line styles, shapes, sizes, angles, placement, perspective, framing, layering, blocking.

Consider the relationship between elements and the overall layout. Please provide a copy of the original page with your tracing. You might consider photocopying your tracing before annotating it as this will allow you to make corrections. This assignment is worth 30% of the final grade in this course.

There is no Registrar scheduled exam for this course. There are no extra-credit assignments for this course. You do not need to complete all assignments to receive a passing grade in this course.

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be graded with no loss of marks, but will receive no written comments.

Attendance and participation expectations:

As this is an asynchronous course, there are no attendance and participation expectation.
