**Course description:** Prerequisite: 12 units of courses labelled English at 300 level or above. This course will introduce the scholarly study of comic books in the United States, with a particular focus on the period commonly referred to as “the Golden Age”, roughly 1934 to 1960. Students will study the major genres of the period in an effort to historicize the rapid development of a new publishing format: the comic book.

**Texts and readings:** As this course will focus on comic books in the public domain, there is no required text book for this course.

Readings from scholarly journals are accessible online through the University of Calgary library. A complete list of readings will be provided in the first class.

**Assignments and Evaluation:**

This class will use a version of scaffolded learning for its evaluation. The advantage of this approach is that it places responsibility for workload directly in the hands of the students. There are a total of forty-seven different assignments for this course, twenty-two of which will be completed during class time and twenty-five of them outside of class time. Students are not required to do all of the assignments, but the final grade in the course will reflect the effort contributed by each student. Assignments will be graded as Proficient, Below Proficient, and Above Proficient. A grade of Proficient will result in full marks being assigned for the work. Works adjudicated as Below Proficient will lose up to half their marks, while those graded as Above Proficient may receive greater than 100%. A breakdown of the various assignments and their weights is below:

**In-Class Writing** (22 x 10 points each = 220 points). During twenty-two of our class sessions, students will be afforded time to do brief responses to prompts in the lecture. In-Class writing will be collected at the end of class sessions (please leave it by the door on your way out!).

**Writing Response** (7 x 30 points each = 210 points). At seven points during the term, students will be prompted on D2L to write a brief response to a question posed by the instructor that directly relates to the Required Readings for a class session. Students should respond in approximately a paragraph to the

prompt. Students are required to post their response to the dropbox on D2L no later than midnight on the day *before* the class session in which it is due.

**McCloud Writing Response** (8 x 20 points each = 160 points). At eight points during the term, students will be prompted on D2L to write a brief response to a question posed by the instructor that directly relates to the chapter from *Understanding Comics* for a class session. Students should respond in approximately a paragraph to the prompt. Students are required to post their response to the dropbox on D2L no later than midnight on the day *before* the class session in which it is due.

**Creative Response** (7 x 30 points each = 210 points). At seven times during the term, students will be prodded to produce a short (generally one page) creative response to a work that we are examining in class. These projects will be prompted on D2L and may include Tracing project; Drawn lecture notes; Detournement; Autobiographical breakdown; Fable thumbnails; and Three Card Nancy.

**Graphic Novel Review (Due April 11)** (1 x 100 points = 100 points). Students should write a short review (1 to 2 pages) of any graphic novel of their choice. The review should discuss how formal, stylistic, and thematic choices made by the cartoonist(s) become evident in the work. This assignment may be handed in at any time during the term.

**Understanding Comics Project (Due February 14)** (1 x 300 = 300 points). Students will prepare a project on Scott McCloud's book *Understanding Comics*. If the project takes the form of an essay, it should be approximately five to seven pages. Essays may build on earlier written responses, but need not. If the project takes a creative form, the work should be comparable to an essay of approximately five to seven pages. Projects will be graded on scholarly research, analysis, and argumentation. Students are required to post their response to the dropbox on D2L no later than midnight on the due date.

**Final Project (Due April 11)** (1 x 300 = 300 points). Students will prepare a project on one of the comics read during the term. If the project takes the form of an essay, it should be approximately five to seven pages. Essays may build on earlier written responses, but need not. If the project takes a creative form, the work should be comparable to an essay of approximately five to seven pages. Projects will be graded on scholarly research, analysis, and argumentation. Students are required to post their response to the dropbox on D2L no later than midnight on the due date.

### **Registrar-scheduled final exam.**

There will not be a registrar-scheduled final exam in this course.

Assignments must be uploaded to the course dropbox on D2L. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

**PLAGIARISM**

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
