Course description:

In this course, we will be examining several contemporary popular prose genres including YA/children's lit, graphic novel, horror, romance, fantasy, and science-fiction, as well as other forms of popular writing including advice/letter writing, to inform and inspire students' own popular writing practice. Through an emphasis on in-class writing activities and group work, this class encourages experimentation beyond literary conventions.

There are no course pre-requisites for this course.

Assignments and Evaluation:

Story concept 5% (approx. 200 words)

This assignment is a description about the short story you will be working towards writing in this class, written as in the style of a synopsis you would read at the back of a book.

Assignment #1 – Setting development 25% (approx. 500 words)

This assignment will include a detailed description of the setting of your short story, and one consideration in the development of your setting that is inspired by the setting from one of the primary texts.

Assignment #2 – Character development 25% (approx. 500 words)

This assignment will include a detailed description of the primary character(s) in your short story, and one consideration in the development of your character(s) that is inspired by a character from one of the primary texts. The primary text referenced here can't be the same as the one referenced in Assignment #1.

Short Story 30% (approx. 750 words)

A short story in the genre of your choice that features the setting and character(s) you developed in the earlier assignments, and at least one writing technique/choice featured in of the primary texts. One copy will be submitted to me and will also be discussed in your pair/group.

Response to peer feedback 15% (approx. 250 words)

This assignment is a critical reflection on feedback you will receive from in your pair/group after sharing your short story, and must include at least two specific examples of feedback you received, the name of your classmate(s) who provided the feedback, and how you intend on responding to the feedback in your future revision of your story.

This class has no final exam.

Assignment Policies

- Please make every effort to take assignments directly to the instructor during class time. If it is not
 possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will
 be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
