Course description:

Survey of the genre of science fiction, from its origins to the present.

Course learning outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe the history, conventions, and features of science fiction genre.
- Attend to details and appreciate the value of digging deeply into a text
- Persuade readers of your thesis with textual evidence
- Search for and locate books, articles and reference material through print and electronic databases and resources
- Follow proper documentation and adhere to academic integrity (including avoiding plagiarism)
- Engage in meaningful conversations about literature with peers.

Texts and readings:

Attendance expectations:

Please include your name and ID number on all assignments and format the file name of all documents uploaded to D2L as: Last name_Assignment title_Term. **Note:** It is your responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment and to ensure that you submit the proper version (particularly in courses requiring electronic submission).

Policy for Late Assignments

Assignments submitted after the deadline may be penalized with the loss a partial letter grade (e.g.: A- to B+) for each day or portion of a day late. Assignments that are late because of technical difficulties that you as the end user experience will be considered late; it is a good idea to give yourself time to manage any technology problems that may arise.

You have one free pass for one late assignment during the term for which you will not be penalized the late penalty, but only one. After that late assignment free pass is used, all other assignments will be docked for the late assignment. The late pass cannot be applied to tests or quizzes and the assignment for which it is used must be submitted before the last day the class meets during the semester. Assignments for which the late pass is used will receive a grade but no comments.

Students must reach the minimum percentage threshold for the grade range to receive that letter grade. For example, to receive an A- a student must have surpassed the minimum threshold of 80.00% in the course.
