Course Description:

With current debates in the US in particular from the right-wing politicians banning the teaching of critical race theory, it is important to examine the long history of critical race studies, its origins in critical legal studies in the 80s and 90s, its various national and academic formations, especially in Canada, and its intersectionality with other fields such as critical whiteness, ethnic and critical Indigenous studies. In particular, this course has a commitment to praxis and making theory applicable to the real world and communities, so this is a chance to apply CRT lenses to an analysis of current events.

Course learning outcomes:

- 1- An understanding of Critical Race Theory and its main principles
- 2- An understanding of what racism is and its endemic nature
- 3- An understanding of the diverse methods of inquiry and diverse forms of CRT scholarship
- 4- An understanding of a wider range of vocabulary to draw on when discussing issues of race, racism, and settler colonialism.
- 5- An understanding of how to apply CRT lenses to an analysis of current events.

Texts and readings:

Other required texts will be available through the UofC library website and D2L. I will provide a reading schedule that shows the weekly readings. It also highlights the important dates.

Assessments and Evaluation:

A detailed explanation of each item (along with the deadlines) will be provided.

First Critical Response: 20%

Seminar Discussion (presentation): 20% Theory and Praxis discussion board D2L: 10%

Final Paper: 30%

Reflection, Attendance and Participation: 20%

Students are asked to reflect on their overall engagement and attendance throughout the semester. The reflection helps students to situate themselves in the grading scheme (see below).

Attendance and participation expectations:

Students are expected to attend class regularly and to be fully present and engaged in class activities and discussions. These are part of the participation grade, as outlined in the assessment components section above. Any unexcused absences will reduce the final class participation and attendance grade. To be actively engaged you should be able to make thoughtful comments throughout each class session that reflect that you have done the assigned reading, that you are grappling with the implications of the reading and that you can respond effectively in classroom debates about different interpretations of the reading. You can also ask questions if you are not sure about how to interpret the reading.

A = Student engages in all activities, and frequently contributes *thoughtful* comments and questions to class discussions that enhance understanding of the material being discussed.

 \mathbf{B} = Student engages in most of the activities and occasionally offers a comment or question in class.

C = Student engages in some activities and/or class discussions

D/F= There is little evidence of engagement in class activities and discussions.

Additional Regulations:

- There will not be a Registrar-scheduled exam.
- All assignments must be completed in order to receive a passing grade.
- There are no extra credit assignments.
- Make-up assignments, excused absences, and extensions will only be issued by the instructor in the event of extenuating circumstances.
- Assignments must be submitted on the date that they are due. The late penalty for assignments is a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each day (not a business day) that the assignment is overdue. No assignments will be accepted four days past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor.

Grading System:

Course grades are based on the University of Calgary four-point Undergraduate Grading System and the standard percentage conversion chart of the Department of English:

- Although the A+ is solely an honorific that entails no additional points in the four-point system, the course instructor will employ this mark to distinguish superlative work that far exceeds expectations in style, correctness, intellectual depth and breadth, sophistication, and originality.
- Also, students must reach the minimum percentage threshold for the grade range to receive that letter grade. For example, to receive an A- a student must have surpassed the minimum threshold of 80.00% in the course.
