**Course description:** This course blends creative writing with readings of poets and analysis of published contemporary poetry. Students will be encouraged to explore a range of styles, as well as experiment, play with, write and re-write their own work in light of critiques by fellow students, the instructor and the implicit examples found in literature.

Recommended: A selection of contemporary poetry books (3-5) of your choice (this century). A notebook or journal for your writing.

#### Assignments and Evaluation:

Class Participation (20%) – If you aren't here then you aren't participating.

Written Assignment (30%) – See assignment sheet distributed in class.

**Final Portfolio (50%)** – This is a two part assignment. 1. A professional manuscript of 10-14 polished poetry pieces or the equivalent that you have produced during this semester. 2. Hand in a statement of self-evaluation.

12 point font and 1.5 spacing is the recommended guideline.

You will notice this class does not have a final exam. Why? Because a portfolio is a representation of the work you have done over the course of the semester. It is the best way to evidence your learning. It stands as an accumulated representation of your best work. Proficiency in grammar and convention are expected.

Final Reading – you are expected to participate in either the end of year poetry slam or the in class reading.

\*\* Assignments are due on the last day of class in class, with no exceptions. No assignments will be accepted past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor.

**Class Structure**: This is a class is based on Socratic method and integrates workshop, presentations, and lecture. You will be expected to participate in discussions, demonstrate critical thinking skills, and attend the class. Marks will be deducted for apathy, lethargy, and absence.

This class allows you to focus on the art form called poetry. You will practice being a poet (etymology in the idea of the "maker"). It follows the practice of poet focusing on:

- 1. Innovation, imagination, or the birth of the idea
- 2. The action of free writing and/or writing to record as a messy process
- 3. Editing and revision
- 4. Reading for critical evaluation and acquisition of skill.

Workshop is conducted on a sign-up basis (based on registration, this will be often – every second or third class). You will be expected to print off copies of your work to provide to the class. You are expected to read aloud in this class.

Attendance and Workshop: Students who miss more than 6 hours of class time are at risk of failing the course. I, of course, will do what I can to ensure a creative and inspirational tone. If you aren't here you aren't participating. Workshop is reliant on the energy and discourse in the room.


This grade is calculated on a 1/3 basis of workshop, attendance, and discourse.

Assignment Sheet

Choosing **ONE** of the following two options:

Written Assignment:

1. Choose one poetic form in the textbook: ie. Sonnet, haiku, sestina, etc (I'm open to suggestions if you have a particular interest). Research the origins of the form, the structure of the form, an example of the form and discuss how the form contributes to the meaning of the poem or its genre (that could mean historically, artistically, or otherwise – keep in mind poetry is often an agent for social change or an art born of its time). This essay should be a minimum of 2200-2500 words (upper word count is flexible). Provide adequate research (4 or more sources in MLA format).

#### OR

2. Looking at a two contemporary Canadian poetry books published in the last decade, evaluate the books as a whole, comparing and considering: voice, technique, craft, structure, emotive pull, syntax, diction, or form, style as ways of evaluating.

\*Minimum of five sources. Minimum output usually results in minimum result.

## PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

(a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),

(b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,

(c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,

(d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
