Course description:

A study of selected works of eighteenth-century fiction: Aphra Behn, *The History of the Nun* (novella); Daniel Defoe, *Moll Flanders* (300 pages); Samuel Richardson, *Pamela* (500 pages); Henry Fielding, *Shamela* (60 pages); Frances Burney, *Evelina* (450 pages); and Jane Austen, *Pride and Prejudice* (300 pages).

Please note that page counts are approximate and will vary a little depending on the edition and format. The average weekly reading assignment will be in the neighbourhood of 150 pages.

Course learning outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. To identify generic conventions of the eighteenth-century novel
- 2. To identify major developments in the history of the eighteenth-century novel in Britain
- 3. To evaluate how eighteenth-century fiction both reflects and makes cultural change

Texts and readings:

Works by Behn and Fielding will be read in open-access online versions; the other novels are available at the campus bookstore.

Learning technology requirements:

The course D2L site will be the organizational hub for this course. You are responsible for checking the site regularly for announcements and any changes to the schedule.

- There are no particular assignments that must be completed to qualify for a passing mark in this course; however, failure to complete all assignments may result in a failing grade in the course.
- Late assignments will be penalized at the rate of 5% per date of lateness including weekends. Late assignments may not be accepted after three days without previous permission of the instructor.
- All assignments must be uploaded to the appropriate D2L Dropbox in the format specified. No email submissions will be accepted.

Grading System:

Assignments will be assessed on the following scale. Where letter grades are used, the grade will be calculated numerically at the mid-point of the corresponding percentage scale (e.g. an 'A' is calculated at 87%). Grades will not be rounded either up or down.

Although the A+ is solely an honorific that entails no additional points in the 4-point system, the course instructor will employ this mark to distinguish superlative work that exceeds expectations in every respect.
