ENGLISH 520-01 WINTER 2019

COURSE TITLE: Community Engagement Through Literature

Instructor: Dr. S. Forlini

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Course description: This course will combine classroom and community-based learning in partnership with the Calgary Public Library's "Creative Writing Club" program. The goals of "Community Engagement through Literature" are to explore practical ways that knowledge gained in the study of English might serve the community and to reflect on the relationship between literary studies and public service.

Students will meet in a formal classroom setting to examine and discuss assigned readings on service learning and community engagement. Once a week, students in teams of two will work in a community partner setting (one of six library branches), bringing their expertise and interest in literature to support students in grades 5-9 through fostering better study habits and encouraging success in English Language Arts through creative writing. Students will be encouraged to actively test out possible approaches to creative writing, drawing from 826 National and other resources. University volunteers are also expected to be positive mentors and role models. This is a pilot program for the Library so students in ENGL 520 will have the opportunity to shape how the program works and to offer valuable feedback to the Library on the program's strengths and challenges.

Students are required to have successfully completed the criminal record check, as explained by the Calgary Public Library, in advance of the start of classes in January. Each week, students are expected to arrive at their assigned branch punctually and to contribute to the programming described by the branch coordinator. If a student cannot, for good reason, attend a session, it is important that both the instructor and the branch are notified ahead of their expected arrival. Further, a student must notify the instructor and the Library immediately in the event s/he is ill or injured or involved in any claims concerning the activities he or she has taken or not taken during the sessions.

In the on-campus seminar with the course instructor, students will read works that explore service learning in the context of literary and related studies and discuss these ideas as well as reflect critically on their volunteer practice. A schedule of readings will be circulated in the first meeting of our class and posted to D2L; students are expected to have completed assigned readings prior to the relevant seminar.

There will be an orientation meeting at the Library prior to the start of the volunteer component and a wrap-up meeting with all participants in April: students must attend both of these sessions.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
