Course description:

Regularly hailed as the most important comic book ever published, Art Spiegelman's Holocausthistory/memoir *Maus* (1986; 1992) has played a fundamental role in shaping the way that comics are studied in the contemporary university. In this course we will undertake a close analysis of Maus, Spiegelman's work before and after its publication, and the substantial scholarly literature that exists on the work in order to understand how and why this particular comic gained its outsized cultural reputation.

Course learning outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a knowledge of the cultural trajectory of comic books in the United States
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the formal properties of comics
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of the way thinking and writing about comic books has changed over time
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of how processes of consecration operate in the cultural field

Texts and readings:

Spiegelman, Art. *Maus*. Please note that three distinct editions of this text exist: two paperback volumes (Volume 1: My Father Bleeds History (1986) and Volume 2: And Here My Troubles Began (1992), a slipcase edition collecting the two, and a single volume edition comprising both books. As there is no substantial difference in these editions, students should feel free to buy any of them, but the hardcover single edition has been ordered through the bookstore.

Spiegelman, Art. *Breakdowns*. The new softcover edition (December 2022) has been ordered through the bookstore, but the either of the previous two hardcover editions would suffice.

Chute, Hillary. Maus Now: Selected Writing (2022). Hardcover or Kindle editions are available.

Additional readings from scholarly journals are all accessible online through the University of Calgary library. A complete list of readings will be provided in the first class.

Assignments and Evaluation:

Post-Maus Review (20% of final grade). Due March 23. A list of autobiographical graphic novels published in the decades after *Maus* will be circulated to the class, with each student responsible for choosing a different work. Students should prepare a report in the form of a short (no longer than five minutes) PowerPoint or video presentation about the work and its relationship to Spiegelman's work. Projects will be uploaded to the D2L Discussion Forum for the class so that other students can learn about the work. This presentation can be less formal than the other work in this class, essentially functioning as a review.

Presentation of Reading (20% of final grade). Due Date February 9 – March 23, depending on sign up. Students will prepare a SHORT (no longer than five minutes) presentation of one of the journal articles assigned for the day and will present it at the beginning of the class. Given enrolment, there may be as many as three presentations per day, so students may choose to coordinate their efforts so as not to duplicate each other's work, although each student will be responsible for a different primary reading. Presentations saved as PowerPoints should be uploaded to the D2L site by 9:00am on the day of the presentation so that they are ready to go at the beginning of class time. Students will also be responsible for responding to questions and comments from their peers about their findings.

Presentation Feedback (throughout the term; 20% of final grade). All students are expected to provide a substantive feedback (NO MORE THAN 150 words of writing) for each of the presentations made in class. This feedback should be constructive, and it will be used as the basis for the feedback prepared for your classmates. Presentations will occur in eleven class sessions and you are not expected to contribute on the day that you present. Feedback will be marked Pass/Fail and ten Passing grades will equal full marks on this portion of the class. Feedback should be uploaded to D2L within twenty-four hours of the completion of the class session.

Final Project Due 11 April 2023. (40% of final grade). The final project can be an essay (8-10 pages) or take on another form (film, data set, creative project). If a student opts to proceed with a project that is not an essay, this should be discussed with the professor so that the project can be calibrated as representing an equivalent amount of work as the paper.

- There is no Registrar scheduled exam for this course. There are no extra-credit assignments for this course. You do not need to complete all assignments to receive a passing grade in this course.
- Assignments submitted after the deadline will be graded with no loss of marks, but will receive no written comments.

Attendance and participation expectations:

There are no attendance and participation expectation beyond the feedback assignment discussed above.
