COURSE TITLE: Old English Poetry

Course description: An introduction to Old English poetry, with special attention to narrative verse, including *Beowulf* and Aelfric's *Lives of Saints*. Reading knowledge of Old English is not a prerequisite for this course, but students without it will acquire it in the course of the term—only early in the course will works be read in translation.

Assignments and Evaluation:

Grammar test: 25%

This test will be written in class about six weeks into the course (date TBA) and will test your knowledge of Old English grammar.

Seminar presentation: 15%

Each student will prepare and present introductory remarks of about a half hour to start discussion of a poem.

In-class translation: 25%

Beginning in the fourth week of class, students will prepare passages of poetry for in-class translation; this will become a more central feature of class work as the term goes on.

Final essay:

35%

Each student will submit an article-length (15- 20 page) paper on some aspect of Old English poetry at the end of class. This paper may be on the same poem chosen for the seminar presentation.

There is no final examination in this class.

Students must submit all assignments to achieve a passing grade in the course.

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized (with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each business day [not class] that the assignment is overdue.

Grading system:

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH STATEMENT ON PRINCIPLES OF CONDUCT

According to the University Calendar, (<http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/j.html>)

“The University of Calgary community has undertaken to be guided by the following statements of purpose and values: to promote free inquiry and debate, to act as a community of scholars, . . . , to respect, appreciate, and encourage diversity, [and] to display care and concern for community”.
