COURSE TITLE: Theoretical & Cultural Studies – Mobilizing Affect

Instructor: Dr. Susan Bennett

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Office hours: Tuesdays 1-3. Students are also welcome to arrange appointments on other days/times by prior arrangement via email.

Course description: Duke University Press published *The Affect Theory Reader* in 2010, a volume by their own description, designed to consolidate and build ‘momentum in the burgeoning area of affect studies’ (<https://www.dukeupress.edu/The-Affect-Theory-Reader/>). As an interdisciplinary practice that has attracted contributions from some of the key thinkers in humanist and social science disciplines, affect studies has by now established itself as vital to the examination of domains as diverse as the aesthetic, the political, the archival and the ethical.

This course will examine a range of affect theory, starting with Eve Sedgwick’s landmark text *Touching Feeling: Affect, Pedagogy, Performativity* (Duke, 2003) and the introduction to *The Reader*. We will explore how the field has expanded its practices and how the turn to affect has shaped new paths of inquiry in English Studies. Students are expected to buy copies of *Touching Feeling* and *The Affect Theory Reader*. These two books will be supplemented by a variety of relevant articles, all accessible through the Taylor Family Digital Library.

A schedule of readings for each week will be provided at our first class and posted to D2L.

Assignments and Evaluation:

In-class presentation (a twenty-minute presentation, exploring assigned readings for a particular week and designed to stimulate class debate): 25%

In-class response paper (a ten-minute response to the presentation, addressing key points in the presentation and designed to stimulate class debate): 15%

Research paper proposal and preliminary bibliography (500 words plus ten-item bibliography): 15%

Research paper (3000-4000 words): 45%

There will not be a registrar-scheduled exam in this class.

The in-class assignments are oral delivery only. The instructor will provide a grade and feedback in writing one week after the presentation/response. The research proposal and preliminary bibliography will be presented orally and submitted electronically to the instructor. The final research paper will be submitted electronically. Detailed assignment descriptions will be provided on D2L and discussed in class.

Students are expected to complete all assigned readings ahead of class meetings and to participate regularly and respectfully in discussions. All students will have the opportunity in the final research paper to apply the ideas tackled in this course to a topic and/or area that reflects their own scholarly interests.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
