Course description: One of the major figures in the historical canon and long considered the "father of English poetry," Geoffrey Chaucer continues to inspire contemporary critics and authors as a locus of engagement, provoking such diverse responses as Glen Burger's *Chaucer's Queer Nation* and Angie Abdou's novel *The Canterbury Trail*. In this course, we will read most of the works of Chaucer, including *Troilus and Criseyde* and *The Canterbury Tales*, and consider them in the various contexts that are available to us, including relevant historical documents, reader responses in different periods, modern critical schools, and creative adaptations such as Bowdlerizings, retellings, trans-mediations, and misappropriations. Students have the option of submitting a creative work in lieu of a term essay.

Texts and readings:

Benson, Larry D., ed. *The Riverside Chaucer*. 3rd ed. (either the Houghton Mifflin original 1987 hardback or later paperback editions of this from various publishers are acceptable). This text is out of print and must be purchased online.

Other online or distributed materials as assigned.

Assignments and Evaluation:

Seminar leadership: 30%

Each student will lead two seminars of approximately 75 minute length, the first introducing one of the tales from Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales* along with at least one critical or creative response to that tale; the second focused on the student's final project. The seminars will each count for 15% of the final grade. The second seminar may either consist of the presentation of a conference paper length version of the final project, distributed to the class in advance, or of an introduction to the primary text(s) and critical texts the student intends to engage in the final project, with those texts assigned as reading in advance to fellow class members.

Middle English exam: 20%

Approximately the fifth week of term, depending on student progress, a half-hour examination will test students' ability to read and translate Chaucer's Middle English.

Final Project (term essay or creative project): 50%

Each student will prepare a final project, which may either be an academic essay or (for students intending to present a creative thesis in English and with permission of the instructor) a creative response to the works of Geoffrey Chaucer. Creative projects must be cleared with the instructor early on, ideally by the week after the Middle English exam. All students, whether preparing an essay or a creative project, must meet with the instructor over the final project twice, once with an idea or proposal, next with an outline or draft. Critical or theoretical essays should be about 6250 words (minus bibliography but including notes); creative projects may vary in length, but must represent an equivalent amount of effort and engagement. The term essay or creative project is due on the last day of classes, Friday, December 9.

There will be no Registrar scheduled exam.

There will be no grade penalty for final projects submitted by one day before my grading deadline for the course (TBA), but the amount of feedback I am able to give will rapidly diminish after the submission deadline of December 9. Projects submitted after one day before my grading deadline for the course without a previously-arranged extension (or deferral of term work) will be penalized one third of a grade (e.g. A- to B+) for each calendar day (NOT business day) that the assignment is overdue.

Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause. PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
