Course description: This course is designed to offer students new to graduate studies or new to the University of Calgary an introduction to a variety of scholarly and professional skills. The aim is to ensure you have the training to help you succeed academically and professionally. To this end, guests with a range of expertise will meet with us each week to present their area of research or their research methodologies, to help you develop specific skills (grant writing for example, or advanced library research), or guide you through useful practices (such as proposal writing and conference presenting).

Texts and readings: Students should have available for their use (either in print or online) the most recent MLA guide (7th edition), and a good handbook of English grammar and usage. The Purdue University Online Writing Lab (OWL) has links to citation styles (<https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/747/10/>) and a good number of resources on grammar and writing, especially useful for teaching: <https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/>

Assignments and Evaluations: *This is a credit/fail course.* You should expect to be given assignments by our guest instructors, for instance in library research or proposal writing, and every student is expected to write an application for SSHRC and other scholarships, as well as a conference proposal. (If you hold a SSHRC currently, you are exempted from the SSHRC sessions and grant proposal requirement.) Instructors responsible for specific assignments will communicate to me when assignments have been satisfactorily completed, and I will compile and submit the credit/fail grade for each student. *Students must complete all required assignments and attend classes in order to receive a pass in this course.* Please make every effort to take assignments directly to the instructor who has assigned it. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office. Attendance and participation are mandatory. If you must miss a class please let me know in advance by e-mail. I am happy to discuss any concern with you, so do not hesitate to be in touch.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
