Official Course Description

Examination of current environmental issues related to physical geography, including topics such as climate change, energy and sustainable resource development, weather extremes, and natural hazards. The course uses contemporary topics to introduce fundamental principles of physical and environmental geography while highlighting societal impacts and influences.

Course Objectives

This course provides an overview of issues related to changes in the Earth's environment, including the atmosphere, ecosystems, water and physical landscapes. Given that the global environment is ever changing, the course considers how the Earth's environmental systems have operated and changed in the past due to natural factors and how humans have impacted environmental systems.
