Course Content:

The chief aim of this course is to introduce students to the basics of physical and human geography. The discussion will focus on interrelationships between various physical and cultural phenomena, as related to contemporary world affairs and issues. Specific examples and issues will be discussed in a global context. There will be a number of guest lecturers by specialists in physical geography. The exact schedule will be announced in class as it becomes available.

Specific topics introduced and discussed in the course will include:

1) Physical

- Maps and projections
- Landforms & landscapes
- Oceans, rivers & lakes
- Glaciers and Arctic environments
- Weather basics
- Global climate systems

2) Human

- Global populations patterns & population demographics
- Migration patterns
- Cultural identities: religions & languages
- Economic development
- Global agricultural and industrial systems
- Basics of political geography
- Urbanization & global urban systems
