Official Course Description:

Introduction to the physical elements of the environment such as weather, climate, hydrology, landforms, soils, vegetation and the processes producing variations of these elements on the surface of the earth. The social implications of environmental change, disasters, and hazards are emphasized.

Course Objectives:

The primary objective of this course is to introduce and explain essential concepts of Earth surface and near-surface processes and their interactions with each other and the human environment.

Prerequisites:

Pure Mathematics 30 or Mathematics 30-1 or equivalent or Mathematics II (offered by continuing Education).

Notes: this course is intended as a foundation for advanced courses in Geography. Students looking for a general interest Geography course are advised to enrol in Geography 205 or 213
