Official Course Description:

Focuses on the major culture regions of the world and also individual countries. Emphasis on the characteristics, distribution, inter-relationships and comparisons of the major culture and physical phenomena of these areas i.e. population, political situation, economy, language, religion and environment. Some historical developments in each of the areas are presented for perspective, but the major emphasis is on the background for understanding contemporary world affairs.

Course objectives:

1. To develop a greater understanding of the population, political situation, economy, language, religion, environment and cultures of the world's major culture regions through geographical analysis.
2. To evaluate the processes of globalization and how they influence the development of the world's major regions from a cultural, historical, political, and physical perspective.
3. To gain an understanding of current and historical world affairs through a geospatial context.

Discussion will focus on a survey of major culture regions of the world:
