# **Official Course Description**

Foundations of human geography presented with integrative case studies of current and urgent human-environment issues from global to regional to local. Examines the complex interconnections between humans and environment using topics such as climate change, sustainability, development, poverty, food, urbanization, and technologies of the digital age.

### **Prerequisites**

There are no prerequisites for this course.

### **Course Objectives**

The primary objective is an introduction into the foundations and themes of human geography addressing complex interactions at the human-environment interface, geographical methods, and analysis of contemporary issues through concepts and case studies from global to local exploring themes of development, population, economic processes, culture, political structures, environmental change and sustainability.

#### **Course Format**

The course is structured into different thematic units over the duration of the term, with most about one week long. Each topic offers a combination of classroom lectures, tutorials, and asynchronous learning. All are announced with detailed instructions on materials and activities via D2L prior to the next thematic unit. Online accommodation for required in-class activities and deliverables is not generally available.

### **Grading (Weighing)**

60% In-class test (four tests each 15%)

**40%** Tutorial activities (schedule and activities see D2L)

**In-class tests** are conducted in regular classroom, no materials or resources allowed except paper and pens. Four tests are conducted throughout the semester, roughly every 3 weeks. Tentative dates: Jan 30, Feb 27, Mar 20, Apr 5.

Lecture attendance is not required, but highly encouraged as it typically enables more successful learning and exam grades.

Tutorial activities include class discussions, oral and written presentations, and group-based learning activities.

As each in-class tutorial typically involves graded activities, attendance is needed to achieve full grade. Out of fairness to the class, late submissions of any tutorial assignments are subject to a late penalty of 12% per day (prorated).

In the event that you will miss any grading component or course activity, please discuss with the instructor or relevant teaching assistant as soon as you know. Provided valid reasons, possible accommodation can be discussed.
