Official Course Description

Introduces mapping technologies and digital spatial data for solving geographical problems that focus on how to collect, manage, analyze, and communicate diverse spatial data. Topics include geographic information systems (GIS), remote sensing, spatial statistics, geovisualization, cartography, and web mapping.

Course Objectives

The goal of this course is to introduce the wide array of digital mapping and geospatial tools and technologies used in geography and other fields, which increasingly underpin contemporary digital society. Together, we will examine the use of geospatial data and technologies in everyday life and how it is used in industry applications. Some key application areas will include recreation, precision agriculture, landcover, climate change and more. Topics will be explored to both help our thinking about how the tools of digital mapping represent the world, consider the message and ethics of those representations, and data ownership.

Course Format

This course will be in-person on campus, this will be the only means for class delivery. The classes will be a mix of lectures and in-class assignments completed on a computer. Where appropriate, guest lectures will be included.

There is no required textbook for this course. Any relevant readings will be provided and assigned in class.

Additional Course Information

Most deliverables will be submitted through D2L and, as a result, will be automatically time stamped. A deliverable is considered late if the time stamp is later than the published due date/time indicated.
