Course Content

This is a survey course that emphasizes environmental problems and resource management at various scales (e.g., local, regional, national, international) with a focus on Canadian issues. Environmental problems and resource management considerations involve several interacting systems including the physical environment, economy, politics, and culture. The course will focus on the scope of various environmental issues and touch on the implications of various management options.

Topics: a readings list will be distributed in the first week of classes.

Objectives:

- To develop knowledge of concepts for understanding environmental issues and resource management.
- To appreciate the variety of approaches for understanding environmental problems.
- To understand the socio-political complexity of environmental issues/resource management.
- To develop critical appraisal skills.

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, and then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

Should the writing of a midterm examination for an entire lecture section become impossible due to events beyond the control of the instructor (such as, and not exclusively consisting of; inclement weather, instructors illness, unavailable facilities, or other "acts of fate") the midterm examination will be written one week later.
