Official Course Description:

Environmental and resource issues, with emphasis on topics such as sustainability; ethics; planning; policy and decision making; and management strategies. Case examples highlight issues in resource sectors such as freshwater, oceans, parks and wildlife, tourism and recreation, forests and energy.

Prerequisite: N/A

Course Content:

This course focuses primarily on the impact of human activities on the environment, the challenges involved in achieving environmental sustainability, and on policies, plans, and strategies devised to move society and environment toward a sustainable future. This course integrates dimensions of human and physical environmental problems and highlights the roles of critical reflection, local action, stewardship and cooperative problem solving in environmental management.

Objectives:

- to instill knowledge, concepts and values critical to the study, management and understanding of our environment.
- to gain an understanding of the distribution, use, extraction and impact of global natural resources, the effects of human activities on a range of natural resources globally, and aspects of the uncertainty, complexity and conflict that characterize both the use and management of resources globally.
 - To study and understand the concepts of maintaining and sustaining the environment as a resource.
 - To gain an understanding of environmental problems and issues of sustainability within select world regions through case study examples.

Text(s)/Readings:

Links to supplemental readings will be posted on Blackboard. Course-related assistance and reference materials will also be placed in the Geography Department Collections Room (ES457).

Assessment:

Assessment is based on three lecture exams, one class presentation with a written report and a research assignment. For exams, basic knowledge-based skills will be assessed in questions that ask you to sort, define or classify items. The integration of communication skills with critical thinking skills will be assessed through comprehensive questions that require short written answers. Short written answers may include assessment of group discussion outcomes and individual ethical reasoning skills or group presentation materials.

Course Requirements:

To obtain a passing grade in this course you must:

Acquire all lecture materials and submit all assignments. You must earn 50% or more on the exams, assignments, and presentations in this course in order to pass. You do not have to pass every component but you do need to earn 50 points out of the 100 points that comprise the course exams and assignments to pass the course. Attend at the date, time and place all course exams. In the event of a missed exam, you must have emailed the instructor before the exam. Make-up exams are set at the discretion of the instructor. There are no re-writes of exams for any reason.
