Official Course Description

Environmental and resource issues, with emphasis on topics such as climate change, sustainability, ethics, planning, policy and decision making, and management strategies. Case examples highlight issues in resource sectors such as freshwater, oceans, parks and wildlife, tourism and recreation, forests and energy.

Course Objectives

The primary objective of Geography 324 is to assess the cumulative impact of human activities on the environment, the challenges involved in achieving environmental sustainability, and on policies, plans, and strategies devised to move society and environment toward a sustainable future. Using the framework of political ecology, this course integrates dimensions of human and physical environmental problems and highlights the roles of critical reflection, local action, stewardship and collaborative problem solving in environmental management.
