Geography 393 will be offered during the Overseas Field School, Summer Session 2007

Official Course Description:

This half-course centres on data collection techniques and field research applied to environmental problems and resources in regions outside North America. The course focuses on recourses, environmental problems relating to both natural and human landscapes. This itinerary provides spatial settings for diverse studies and comparative analyses. Topics will include impacts of climate change, land degradation, deforestation, humans' current and historical effects on landscapes, water issues, geothermal & hydrocarbon resources, natural environmental disturbances, air pollution and an examination of different agricultural practices.

The following pre-session components are included: one assignment, one paper, and introductory and topical lectures; *en route* components will include lectures, seminars, one-on-one student-instructor consultations, group study tours, and lectures by local experts.

While overseas, students must complete one oral presentation, three field study assignments, an extensive field notebook, and a final examination. **Note:** Group travel study is interspersed with numerous opportunities for small group and individual instructor-approved studies.
