Official Course Description:

Oceanic circulation and atmosphere-ocean inter-actions as controls of climate. Focus on the role the marine cryosphere in radiation and energy exchange at regional, hemispheric and global scales. Climatic variability in historic time and during the instrument period.

Course Goals:

Students in this course will learn to:

- 1. Understand basic ocean circulation, and how it is controlled by air-sea interactions and the underlying properties of seawater.
- 2. Analyze how ocean circulation impacts climate on various spatial and temporal scales.
- 3. Critically analyze and respond to reports (particularly non-scientific) about climate change, climate variability, and our oceans.
- 4. Identify reliable sources of scientific information, and construct knowledge from primary sources.
- 5. Effectively communicate scientific ideas using sound technical writing techniques.
- 6. See how the oceans' impact on climate affects their lives, and the lives of everyone else on the planet.
- 7. Become unique prairie inhabitants who are actually interested in the Earth's oceans!

Required Texts:

No required texts. Readings will be made available through D2L.

Prerequisite:

Geography 305 or consent of the Department

Grading (Weighting):

There is a final examination, to be scheduled by the Registrar's Office. It is not essential to pass all elements/components to pass the course as a whole.
