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Course Content: This course examines geographical and resource analysis and environmental management approaches applied to resource sectors such as forests, wilderness parks and reserves, urban natural areas, freshwater and marine areas. Wherever possible, examples from North America will be used, emphasizing Canadian approaches and their differences and similarities to the American situations. We will also look at the State of the Environment reports to see how natural areas and resources are managed.

General objectives of the course are:

- 1) to develop an appreciation of the range of possible future environments while focussing on local, regional, national and international policy settings;
- 2) to understand how decision-making structures accommodate a variety of current and future societal interests and environmental objectives;
- 3) to consider different management strategies associated with the protection and utilization of natural environments and renewable resources;
- 4) to understand how State of the Environment reports are prepared, and their significance to various sectors; and
- 5) to examine selected case studies from the objectives given above.
