### **Official Course Description:**

Geographical resources analysis and management approaches applied to resource sectors such as urban natural areas, wilderness parks and reserves, freshwater resources and fisheries.

Prerequisite: Geography 321 or consent of the Department

#### **Course Content:**

This course focuses on: exploring human connections and responses to the natural world; understanding concepts such as biophilia, stewardship and sustainability and how they link to human efforts to manage environmental resources; developing an awareness of the importance of different approaches to environmental management. Emphasis is placed on conducting applied research that responds to contemporary regional, local and global environmental issues.

## **Objectives:**

Major objectives of this course include: (1) to explore the ways humans are connected to our natural environment, (2) to appreciate the importance and implications of biophilia, stewardship and sustainability for environmental management, (3) to consider approaches, policies, methods, and institutions aimed at achieving sustainability, and (4) to conduct (applied) research relating to environmental concerns.
