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Official Course Description

Exploration of the challenges associated with environmental management and governance, particularly in terms of achieving sustainability. Emphasis is placed on ongoing local, regional, and global environmental problems, using political ecology perspectives to understand power, discourse and interest mechanisms behind environmental rights, controls, and sustainability needs.

Course Objectives

The course expands on key concepts, knowledge and different perspectives on socio-political systems and contemporary environmental problems, with a critical focus on power and sustainability aspects.

Midterm will be 80 minutes plus 50% technical allowance = **120** minutes. It will be a D2L-based online exam accessible for one attempt within a 24-hour window from **Mon Feb 22 2pm to Tue Feb 23 2pm**. It is an open-book exam permitting all GEOG 428 W21 course materials. Absolutely NO contact or collaboration allowed between students on the scheduled exam days, and no external support related to exam questions.

Final exam will be 120 minutes plus 50% technical allowance = **180** minutes. It will be a D2L-based online exam accessible for one attempt within a 24-hour window, to be **registrar-scheduled** during the W21 final examination period. It is an open-book exam permitting all GEOG 428 W21 course materials. Absolutely NO contact or collaboration allowed between students on the scheduled exam days, and no external support related to exam questions.

Late grading components will be assessed a 5% penalty per started 6 hours late submission.

It is not necessary to pass all components to pass the course as a whole.

The instructor reserves the right to adjust grading to reflect student performance more fairly.

In the event that any grading component or course activity will be missed, please inform the instructor as soon as you know. Provided valid reasons, possible alternative arrangements can be discussed.
