**Official Course Description:**

Introduction to applied statistics, particularly as they are used in geographical analysis. Topics include descriptive statistics, sampling theory and design, probability theory, inferential statistics, geostatistics, spatial statistics, multivariate analysis. Laboratory exercises give students hands-on experience in computer-based statistical analysis.

**Laboratory Assignments:** There will be five lab assignments, each worth 8% of your overall grade for this course. Lab assignments will be assessed using the grading system outlined below. In the event that a student fails a lab assignment, they will have ONE opportunity to improve their performance to attain a passing grade. Assignments will be handed out at the beginning of the appropriate lab session, and are to be handed back at the beginning of the lab session specified on the class schedule.

*Review Tests:* There will be three review tests throughout the term, each worth 15% of your overall grade for this course. These tests will consist of a combination of multiple-choice answer, short written answers, and/or extended written answer/problem solving sections.

*Personal research Project:* The personal research project is worth 15% of your overall grade for this course. This project should be viewed as an opportunity to perform an insightful statistical analysis on a research topic chosen by each student. Students will be responsible for formulating research questions, formulating testable hypotheses; acquiring appropriate data, performing statistical analyses and summary statements and/or conclusion towards answering their stated hypotheses. Students will be responsible for submitting a proposal outlining their proposed research plan, worth 3% and a final research report worth 12%. A detailed set of guidelines will be provided on D2L and in class.
