Official Course Description

History of spatial modelling in geography; comprehensive coverages of techniques, spatial analysis and spatial modelling as currently used within GIS and remote sensing.

Course Objectives

To provide students with analytical tools to help them understand spatial phenomena and to stimulate their critical thinking about spatial processes. The course will focus on the properties of spatial data and their effects on quantitative analysis. Students will learn an array of spatial analytical models, understanding their hypothesis, strengths, and limitations; they will learn to choose the most appropriate techniques for different research questions and spatial data. Concepts and theories of spatial analysis will be discussed, with reference to landmark and current literature.

If the final project is not consistent with the proposal, the proposal will receive a 0 grade.
