Official Course Description:

Focus on advanced GIS applications in core areas; methodological developments in GIS and current research directions in GIS.

Prerequisite:

Consent of the Department. Geography 607 is recommended.

Course Preparation:

Students are expected to have a thorough working and detailed knowledge of a major GIS software platform, preferably the ESRI ArcGIS suite of software.

Required Texts: None

Readings: Additional readings, laboratory guides, and links to electronic resources will be made available during the course, via D2L.

Course Objectives:

This is an advanced course designed to increase the student's understanding of Geographic Information Science (GISc). This will involve critical analysis of theory, concepts, and current research, technical and social developments, along with applications of geographic information systems.

Lab Assignments:

Students will undertake a series of lab assignments designed to provide hands-on experience with advanced topics in GISc. The lab assignments will explore issues of effective spatial analysis and the communication of geographic information within the ArcGIS platform. All assignments must be submitted using the Desire2Learn (D2L) system. Email submissions will not be accepted.

Term Project:

All students will complete a term project due the last day of lectures (15 April 2015).

The goal of each project is to apply a new analytical technique, develop a GIS tool, employ an advanced GIS application, or conduct advanced research in a theoretical or applied area. Detailed term project guidelines will be provided to students' mid-way through the course. All projects must be submitted using the D2L system. Email submissions will not be accepted.

Evaluation:

Students will be evaluated in these areas: (1) Their knowledge of lecture materials, including classroom participation and discussion. (2) Discussions and review of topical literature. (3) Presentations to class. (4) The course project. (5) Quality of written and oral communication. (6) Laboratory assignments
