COURSE CONTENT

A model is a formalised expression of theory of causal situation, which is regarded as having generated observed data. In this seminar we will critique the various pathways followed by modelers and the outcomes. Hopefully by the end of the term, participants would have reinforced their ability and confidence in reading and using literature written in model language.

MY RESPONSIBILITY: I will review the major model types used in all branches of geography; discuss experimental procedures and practices; and demonstrate procedures useful for developing, testing, validating and presenting models. I will review notations and their use in models. [First Three Weeks]

YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

Each participant shall present two seminar papers. The first series of presentations are models taken from a journal. The student will make copies of the journal article available to all students in class two weeks prior to the presentation. Hopefully, the article is one that will challenge the presenter and the class.

The second group of presentations shall involve the student's own research and include discussion about the modeling potential posed by the research. An extended abstract (no more than two pages) is required one week ahead of the seminar.

LENGTH OF PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION:

75 minutes for me, 45 minutes for you.
