Course Description:

Developing a Transit City is increasingly important to cities in North America, and forms more and more of the conversation by politicians, professionals and the general public. This course explores land use, urban form and transit projects in Calgary, North America and overseas to understand how policies and practices are interconnected. This course will require students examine topics through a sustainability lens to understand social, environmental and economic impacts associated with policy and design. The course will involve lectures, site tours and class discussions. Projects will require students to develop real-world case studies and critical assessments of local land use, urban form and transit examples. Class presentations and technical writing are also are key elements of this course.

Objectives of the Course:

- Gain a clear understanding of the transportation-land use relationship, its benefits and the factors influencing it.
- Understand the basic features of public transportation and their application to shape urban form and function, including transit-supportive land use and transit-oriented development.
- Use knowledge gained throughout the course to explore a 'real world' case example of transit and land use integration.
