Sustainable Urbanism Part I

Description

This course focuses on cities on the cutting edge of innovation and implementation of smart technologies and efforts to achieve sustainability. This course will focus on the historical urban development and planning in cities, emphasizing economic, cultural, political and regional geopolitical processes. This introduction will lay the groundwork for addressing innovations in sustainability initiatives and smart technologies in planning, sustainability of resources, food security, transportation, and energy consumption and production that will be covered in UBST 495 also offering on the field study.

Course Objectives

Economic, political, and cultural aspects of sustainability and technology will be considered with respect to urban form, social geography, and mobility systems. Theoretical and practical links between urban, municipal, and national policies, on the one hand, and global sustainability discourses, on the other, will be made.

Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published with the instructor's permission. When using Teams for Education you will access the sessions by logging on to the Teams site.
