Course Description

Once believed to be too small scaled as to require much attention, gentrification now represents the "leading edge" of urban redevelopment and neighbourhood change. More often than not, the contemporary state and governance follow a pro-gentrification stance to attract capital invesment in urban space. The core principle of this course is to examine how larger scaled socio-economic processes influence change at the neighbourhood scale. This course will begin with a general overview of neighbourhood change and the role of the state, but will develop into a detailed focus on gentrification and social processes that (re)produce it. Although the gentrification is a global phenomena and examples from other continents will be incorporated, greater attention will paid to Canada and the United States.

Required Textbook

There will be additional readings required for this course. These will be provided provided through Blackboard no later than one week before their assigned date. One copy of the textbook will be kept on reserve in Geography Collections Room, 4th floor of the Earth Sciences Building. However, it is highly suggested that you purchase the text.

Grading Components

Course grades will be based on several forms of evaluation (Tentative).

- All students are required to read assigned material for this course. Each student is responsible to lead the class in a discussion based on a specific reading assigned to them. Each student will be required construct an outline/summary of their assigned reading as a guide for each participant for the discussion. Each student will be responsible for at least three separate readings.
- The primary course component will be a group project related to neighbourhood change in Calgary. The initial stages of this project will entail a short project proposal (one to two pages) and the construction of a literature review that is relevant for the entire project. Presentations will be given on

the last day of class by each group. The project will also entail a written submission. <u>A more detailed</u> outline of the requirements for this project will be provided separately.
