Official Course Description:

This is the capstone course for Urban Studies majors and minors, dealing with sustainability and what it means in an urban context. The "key to sustainability," according to Gwendolyn Hallsmith, is to understand the city "as a whole system... one that is composed of numerous subsystems." The variety of subsystems that shape cities do not operate independently, rather are mutually interactive, modifying each other over time. These subsystems—economic, social, environmental, cultural, and political—operate at a variety of scales, reverberating back upon each other and the city. Understanding cities as systems and subsystems has critical implications for planning sustainable cities. Planning interventions cannot be conceived as discrete actions, rather they must be considered in terms of system-wide implications. The system drivers, as well as opportunities for intervention, must be considered as well.

The course comprises two components: The first questions the notion of sustainability by unraveling the complex discourse surrounding the concept. The second introduces "systems thinking" as a new way to approach city development. System properties – such as complexity, evolution and path dependence – define the search for "resilience" as a fundamental goal for urban development/redevelopment. The second focuses on a group planning project that emphasizes the theoretical material from the first half of the class to a community development project chosen in collaboration with the Federation of Calgary Communities (FCC). In this project students, drawing on their individual research, will collaborate to produce a vision for community development (contingent on the details of the project chosen by the course instructor and the FCC).
