This course is being offered online in real-time via scheduled meeting times, you are required to be online at the same time.

To help ensure Zoom sessions are private, do not share the Zoom link or password with others, or on any social media platforms. Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.

This course has a registrar scheduled, synchronous final exam. The writing time is 2 hours + 50% buffer time.

Lectures will be posted on D2L in advance of the lecture time, or given during the lecture period and will be available on D2L through to the end of the semester. Downloading and/or otherwise recording the lectures is strictly prohibited.

Laboratory sessions will occur synchronously, online.

There will be no lectures or labs on 5, 6, or 8 April. This is to give time for groups to prepare their presentations, together.

Group presentations will be given synchronously during the lab period on 12 April. Attendance for the full lab period is required of all students.

The midterm examination will be administered synchronously during the regularly scheduled class time on 25 February 2021.

The registrar-scheduled final exam will be administered synchronously during the exam period.

3. **Grading:**

In determining the overall grade in the course the following weights will be used:

Each piece of work (reports, assignments, quizzes, midterm exam(s) or final examination) submitted by the student will be assigned a grade. The student's grade for each component listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade.

The conversion between a percentage grade and letter grade is as follows.

This course will have a final exam that will be scheduled by the Registrar. [The Final Examination Schedule](#) will be published by the Registrar's Office approximately one month after the start of the term. The final exam for this course will be designed to be completed within 2 hours.

The final exam will be administered using an on-line platform. Per section [G.5](#) of the online Academic Calendar, timed final exams administered using an on-line platform, such as D2L, will be available on the platform. Due to the scheduling of the final exams, the additional time will be added to the end of the registrar scheduled **synchronous** exam to support students. This way, your exam schedule accurately reflects the **start time** of the exam for any **synchronous** exams. E.g. If a **synchronous** exam is designed for 2 hours and the final exam is scheduled from 9-11am in your student centre, the additional time will be added to the **end** time of the **synchronous** exam. This means that if the exam has a 1 hour buffer time, a synchronous exam would start at 9 am and finish at 12pm. - **updated April 6, 2021**

7. Examination Policy:

Examinations will occur synchronously, online. Examinations will have 50% extra time built in for technology issues. Work and answers must be shown for all questions on the examination through clearly visible digital photographs of work pages. Clearly visible photographic answers for each exam question must be turned in at the conclusion of the examination period or no credit will be awarded.

Examinations are closed-book. Reference materials, including those available via the internet, are not permitted and any required data or equations will be explicitly given on examinations. Non-programmable calculators are allowed.

Students must receive a passing grade on all course components (D or above), including both examinations, in order to pass the course overall.

For any synchronous assessment, time will be adjusted for SAS students if needed and accommodations for students will be done on a case-by-case basis.

The midterm examination will occur synchronously online on Thursday February 25th during the regularly scheduled (75 minutes) class time and will be designed to be completed in 50 minutes.

The final examination will occur synchronously online at the registrar-scheduled time. The examination will be designed to be completed in 75 minutes, and >112.5 minutes will be permitted for exam completion.

Course Outcomes:

- Identify major types and sources of groundwater contamination and relevant water quality guidelines
- Demonstrate an understanding of fundamental principles governing contaminant transport in the subsurface (i.e. dispersion (including diffusion), advection, sorption, biodegradation);
- Apply a basic quantitative skills and a combination of geological, geochemical, and hydrogeological concepts to groundwater quality problems
- Develop site conceptual models to evaluate groundwater contamination
- Describe various remediation approaches to address groundwater contamination
- Research and Present a contaminant hydrogeology case history
