
History 207: The History of the Americas (Winter 2014 Topic: Slavery in the Americas)



Description: This course explores the history of African slavery in the Americas, focusing especially on the United States and Brazil, the hemisphere's largest and longest-lived slave regimes. We will examine the origins and rise of the international slave trade, the many systems of slave labor that emerged in the Americas, and the experience of work for the enslaved. The class also focuses on the nature of slave life and culture apart from the work regime, resistance to enslavement, and the destruction of legal slavery in the nineteenth-century.
