COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. MID-TERM EXAM, TO BE WRITTEN ON 18 OCTOBER 2007: 30%

The mid-term exam will consist of one essay question chosen from three. Students will be directly responsible for the material covered in class up to and including the 17th of October 2006. This will be an ONLINE EXAM.

2. RESEARCH PAPER, DUE 15 NOVEMBER 2007: 30%

*Essays must be written in **STRICT CONFORMITY** with the Department of History Essay Guide*

*(available on the History Department website: [http:// www.hist.ucalgary.ca](http://www.hist.ucalgary.ca)). Essays **MUST** be limited to 2500 words or about ten pages.*

Late essays will only be excused if accompanied by a written medical excuse filled out, or signed, by a medical professional, or certification by a provincially chartered social worker or psychologist, or by a psychiatrist stating that other unavoidable, non-medical circumstances have made it impossible for you to complete your work within the prescribed deadline. Please notify the instructor in advance if you anticipate such difficulties in the preparation of your written work assignments so that alternate arrangements can be made.

3. FINAL EXAM (SET BY THE REGISTRAR): 40 %

*The final exam will consist of two essay questions to be chosen from six. Students will be responsible for material covered over the **ENTIRE** course. This will be an ONLINE EXAM.*

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism occurs when one submits or presents one's work in a course, or ideas and/or passages in a written piece of work, as if it were one's own work done expressly for that particular course, when, in fact, it is not.

As noted in the **Department of History Guide to Essay Presentation**, plagiarism may take several forms:

Failure to cite sources properly may be considered plagiarism. This could include quotations, and wording used from another source but not acknowledged.

Borrowed, purchased, and/or ghostwritten papers are considered plagiarism, as is submitting one's own work for more than one course without the permission of the instructor(s) involved.

Extensive paraphrasing of one or a few sources is also considered plagiarism, even when notes are used, unless the essay is a critical analysis of those works.

The use of notes does not justify the sustained presentation of another author's language and ideas as one's own.

Plagiarism is a serious academic offence. A plagiarized paper will automatically be failed. Plagiarism may also result in a failing grade for the entire course and other penalties as noted in **The University of Calgary Calendar**.
