#### **Course Description**

Latin America is a vibrant and diverse region that is closely tied to Canada—we share a future. A long history of immigration to Canada along with growing and sizeable investments of Canadian companies in the region ensure that the countries and people of the region have significant ties with us. Recently Latin American companies have begun to invest heavily in our own industrial and resource sectors. Our destinies are linked in far more important ways than just our tourist exploits on the tropical beaches of the region! This course explores Latin America by examining current issues and events that are shaping the region in order to be able to answer the question "what is behind the news". Using an interdisciplinary perspective, the course combines historical, political, social, and cultural approaches to understand contemporary Latin America.

#### **Objectives of the Course**

The student of this course should finish with:

- 1. An understanding of Latin American from an interdisciplinary perspective
- 2. An understanding of recent political social and economic developments in the region
- 3. An understanding of the role US relations play in the region
- 4. An understanding of the role previously-marginalized groups play in the region
- 5. An understanding how the social structure of the region is changing
- 6. The ability to take this knowledge and understanding and apply it as a tool for critical analysis of current events in the region
- 7. A deeper understanding of the place of Canada in the Americas
- 8. Honed skills in critical thinking
- 9. Honed skills in written and verbal communication
- 10. A strong basis from which to develop a comparative framework for understanding the world (beyond Latin America)
