12. OTHER COURSE RELATED INFORMATION:

(a) Course Description

Required, multi-component, program of courses for all graduate students in the Department of Physics and Astronomy designed to assist students in improving their scientific oral and written communication skills. Each student must complete a minimum of three terms of Physics 691 during each graduate course, although the normal load is four terms, and additional terms may be required of students on an as-need basis.

In the Seminar component of P691 (.12/.22/.14/.24), students will give two talks: a 5 minute "Poster Presentation", and a 20 minute Colloquium-level talk. The Poster presentation is to be designed as an advertisement for their (fictitious) poster at a conference (the student will not be preparing an actual poster in this course). The talk should be a very high-level *short* talk, with an edge of advertisement. For the colloquium talk, the students must submit an abstract for their talk, as well as have their supervisor attend their presentation. All students will evaluate their peers' colloquium presentations, using bubble-sheet scoring on a set of fixed questions about the presentations, as well as long-answer comments.

- 1) Practice active listening, and improve their ability to ask reasonable questions on presentations by their peers.
