COURSE INFORMATION

This course serves as an introduction to topics and theories in ethics. Topics include: ethical skepticism, ethical objectivism, as well as the ethical evaluations of actions, lives, and persons. Topics will be discussed under the lens of various ethical theories including: ethical relativism, ethical nihilism, hedonism, desire satisfaction theory, divine command theory, natural law theory, egoism, consequentialism, deontology, contractarianism, virtue ethics, and ethics of care.

- Broad knowledge and comprehension of a diverse set of philosophical issues, concepts, problems, traditions, and views in ethics.
- Ability to distinguish different kinds of moral appraisals.
- Ability to critically, fairly, clearly, thoughtfully, and charitably, state, explain, evaluate, and discuss basic arguments and ideas for various positions in ethics.
- Ability to construct and communicate ideas and arguments that are convincing, plausible, and productive in support of one's own positions relating to topics in ethics.

Shafer-Landau, Russ. *The Fundamentals of Ethics* (Oxford: Oxford University Press). Any edition is acceptable, but the latest is the 5th edition.
