Course Description

This course is an introduction to moral philosophy. There are different sorts of moral appraisal. Some concern the evaluation of actions; for example, what makes right acts right? Others concern the evaluation of character. When is a person virtuous? Yet others concern the evaluation of persons. Under what conditions, for instance, is a person blameworthy for something? Still others concern the assessment of lives. When is a life good in itself for a person? We will examine moral theories of each of these types of appraisal.

Course Learning Outcomes

Students should be able to:

1. Distinguish among different sorts of moral appraisal including appraisals of right and wrong, good and evil, virtue and vice, and moral responsibility.
2. Explain key ethical concepts, such as being obligatory, being intrinsically good, and being morally responsible.
3. Read and comprehend philosophical texts in ethics.
4. Critically analyze ethical issues to be discussed.
5. Write a convincing argument for or against fundamental ethical issues, such as whether pleasure is the sole intrinsic good or whether responsibility requires freedom to do otherwise, to be discussed.
6. Engage in constructive oral argumentation regarding relevant concepts, principles, or theories introduced in the course.

Course Assessment

There will be two in-class quizzes and a one-hour, closed-book Registrar-scheduled final exam, each worth 25% of the total grade. In addition, there will be one paper, to be submitted in class, worth 25% of the total grade. Writing and the grading thereof is a factor in evaluation. Writing should be clear, coherent, and to the point. There will be *no* provisions for “extra-credit.” A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a pass in the course as a whole. You may use a computer to access handouts or readings for the course and to take notes.
