COURSE INFORMATION

This course philosophically examines a portion of issues in the philosophies of sex, love, and death such as: What, exactly, qualifies as sex? What, if anything, makes certain kinds of sexual acts perverted? What does it mean to sexually objectify somebody and is it ever morally permissible to do so? What is the difference between sex and gender and how does that distinction inform how we morally ought to act? What are the different kinds of love and what features do they have? Is one kind of love better than another? Why do we love? Is the experience of love the same for everybody? What makes somebody a friend and are there different sorts of friendships? What, if anything, is it like to be dead? Can we survive the death of our bodies? Should we fear death?
