COURSE INFORMATION

Paternalism occurs when a person or a government prevents someone from acting autonomously, without his or her consent, on the grounds that doing so is in that person's best interest. For example, laws requiring motorists to wear seatbelts and for drivers to refrain from texting while driving are said to be paternalistic laws. Yet, such laws seem to be justifiable restrictions people's autonomy for their own good. In this class, we will consider whether people have an obligation to obey laws in the first place. Then, we consider the concept of paternalism and in what sense a law can be paternalistic. We will consider several different kinds of so-called paternalistic laws – e.g., related to public health measures, sex work, and drug laws, among others – and attempt to understand what, if anything, is particularly objectionable about these laws. Can the law justifiably interfere with someone's autonomy? If so, on what grounds?

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify key ethical concepts, e.g., paternalism, autonomy, etc.
- Comprehend the complexity of ethical reasoning about paternalism.
- Critically digest, interpret, and analyze philosophical arguments.
- Write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions.
- Engage in constructive, respectful, oral and written argumentation.

COURSE ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

Two in-class exams, the first worth 25%, the second worth 30%:

One take-home final exam, worth 35%:

- The final exam will be cumulative. It will be an open book, take-home exam.

Participation, worth 10%

Participation involves active, informed, and consistent contributions to class discussion over the
course of the semester. Please note that "class discussion" includes asking questions or making
a critical point during lecture; posting a discussion question on the D2L discussion board;
sending me an email with a question or critical point about course content.
