COURSE INFORMATION

The world of business involves relations between different groups of individuals. This world has shareholders, corporate managers, employees, customers and those in the local community of a corporation. Since the actions of individuals in one group will impact those in other groups, it is open to us to morally evaluate such actions and the regulations governing those actions. For instance, is it permissible for, or perhaps even a duty of, corporate managers to serve only the interests of shareholders? Does a business owner have a duty to promote equal opportunities to those in a community? Do corporations have a duty to refrain from destroying the environment? This course will address such issues.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES

Based on a study of various ethical theories this course aims to develop the capacity to carefully engage in the moral evaluations of certain actions and regulations. As part of this process students will be given the opportunity to develop their ability to produce clear written summaries of positions and arguments proposed by various ethicists and to produce thoughtful assessments of these proposals.
