Course Description

This course will provide an introduction to Asian philosophy including thought emerging out of Hindu, Buddhist and Chinese philosophies. We will explore how modes of thinking in the "East" differ from traditional Western approaches. Examples of topics to be included are dharma, karma, dependent coarising, suffering, nothingness, the Dao, ritual, the sage and ethics.

Course Learning Outcomes

"Outcomes" for this course cannot be guaranteed and depend upon student effort, which includes keeping up with and reflecting upon the readings, developing writing skills and regular class attendance (not just in body but also in mind).

Students will gain knowledge of Asian philosophical traditions.

Students should be able to write clear, coherent, grammatically-correct papers and exams which analyze primary philosophical texts.

This course is reading intensive and seeks to develop skills of both interpretation and analysis.

Listening and note-taking skills are essential for doing well in the course. We will be analyzing difficult texts in class with opportunity for student participation, which helps to hone these skills. If you are the kind of student who rarely attends lectures, this is probably not the course for you.
