COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will examine a number of controversial topics including the ethical status of abortion, euthanasia and physician assisted suicide, our moral obligations to the environment, freedom of expression, and ethical issues pertaining to business.

PREREQUISITES

There are no prerequisites for this course.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The general aims of the course are to have students acquire the ability to distinguish and appreciate several current ethical issues, the ability to identify philosophical reasoning, particularly to recognize, extract, and evaluate arguments, and finally, the ability to research and write philosophical exams and essays that have plausible theses and reasonable supporting arguments.

Ethical Issues: Perspectives for Canadians, Eldon Soifer (ed.), Broadview Press (any edition)

COURSE ASSESSMENT

The course work will consist of two in-class exams, a quiz, and a term paper (4-6 pages). Thus, writing and the grading thereof is the major factor in the evaluation of your work for this course.

There will be no Registrar-scheduled final exam.

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not essential to pass the course as a whole.
