Course Description

This course will cover the following disputed ethical issues: genetic enhancement; euthanasia and assisted suicide; hunger and poverty; and ethical treatment of animals; These issues have been selected to illustrate various moral considerations including the value of life, our relations to distant others and the scope of our moral obligations. By looking at disputed ethical issues the aim is to learn more about moral considerations as well as to learn how to formulate and evaluate moral positions about ethical issues

This course has no pre-requisites

Course Learning Outcomes

- Understand and explain basic moral concepts
- Recognize and explain facts and values appealed to in arguments about disputed ethical issues
- Recognize and explain moral frameworks appealed to in arguments about disputed ethical issues
- Develop a sensitivity towards and appreciation of some contested moral issues.
- Engage in oral discussion of contested ethical issues
- Evaluate and construct philosophical arguments about disputed ethical issues.

Course Assessment

There will be four types of assignments. How many you complete with a passing grade determines your grade for the course.

Participation: participation requires that you attend class, that you participate in group discussions, that you take your turn conveying group discussion results to the class and that you contribute to general class discussions. A detailed specification for participation will be posted to D2L in the first week of classes.

Two in-class tests: these will test basic understanding of key concepts and moral problems. To pass a test requires a grade of 60%. Dates: February 27 and April 12

Three reflective-engagement assignments: These will require an activity such as writing a personal directive, taking up the Oxfam Hunger challenge, a group poster on animals. Due dates: February 3, March 3, March 31. To be handed in during class or in the drop box in the philosophy department prior to 4 pm.

Three philosophical argument assignments: These will require you to read a philosophical text and articulate philosophical arguments. The assignments are sequenced in difficulty hence you may not receive credit for the second assignment until you have passed the first and you may not receive credit for the third assignment until you have passed the second. Due dates: January 27 or February 17; March 27; April 12. To be handed in during class or in the drop box in the philosophy department prior to 4 pm.

Late Policy:

Missed exams or late assignments will be accepted only with adequate reason such as medical or family emergencies, emotional traumas etc. It is the student's responsibility to contact me, in advance where possible, about missed tests or deadlines. In some cases an alternative assignment will be given where a make-up of the original is not feasible/useful.

Grades:

This class will use specification grading, which means that your grade will be based on the number of assignments that you pass. To pass an assignment you must meet the specifications for that assignment. Students who fail an assignment may redo it once (or do an alternative assignment where re-doing the same assignment is not possible).

All levels require participation. Participation points will be assigned. You must receive 8 points to pass. If a student receives fewer than 8 points, grade will be lowered. For example, a student who completed all the B requirements but gets only 6 or 6 participation points would receive a B-. There will also be a couple of opportunities during the semester for extra participation points. Students who receive 2 extra participation points will have their grades raised. For example a student who completed all the requirements for a B and who received 10 participation points would receive a B+.

D: Pass one exam + pass one other assignment + participation

C: Pass one exam + one reflective-engagement assignment + pass two other assignments + participation.

B: Pass one exam + one reflective engagement assignment + the first philosophical argument assignment + pass three other assignments + participation points

A: Pass all assignments + participation
