Course Description

This course will examine the thought of major philosophers whose work has been considered “existentialist”: Kierkegaard, Nietzsche, Heidegger, Sartre, Camus, and de Beauvoir. We shall study what is distinctive in each philosopher as well as how each draws on, develops, and responds to previous philosophers. We shall further consider the existentialist themes in writings by Dostoyevsky, Kafka, Ralph Ellison, Charles Baudelaire, and Charlotte Perkins Gilman. Finally, we shall analyze instances of the existentialist concept of “bad faith.”

Course Learning Outcomes

- Students will read difficult, complex books/essays that they might not initially understand.
 - Further, students will learn to determine whether the book/essay is positioning itself against another view, either explicitly or implicitly, and be able to state what this view is.
 - Finally, students will acquire the ability to reread and analyze these books/essays on their own and be able to articulate the major and minor arguments made to support the overall argument.
- Students will be able to ask probing and pertinent questions about any material that they do not understand, or ideas that confuse them, or viewpoints with which they disagree. Students will realize that all questions are good questions (with the exception of: “What did we do last class?”).
- Students will learn to write essays that contain clear, convincing, grammatically correct arguments.
- Students will learn why Existentialist Philosophy is such an important and influential movement, and what the distinctions are among what has broadly been characterized as “Existentialism.”
